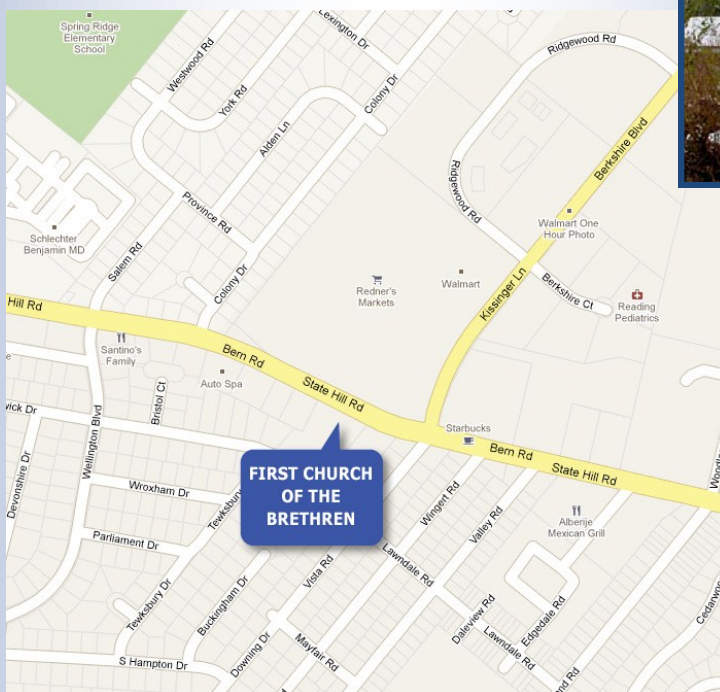

I have a quick and easy to prepare when you just do not feel like preparing a big meal. This was always a hit and I hope you will enjoy it also... Enjoy!

ANGEL HAIR with CRABMEAT, JALAPENO and MINT

Ingredients:

½ lb. cooked crabmeat, (cleaned and picked through)
1 Jalapeno pepper, stemmed, seeded and minced
1 clove garlic, minced
12 fresh mint leaves, torn in pieces
¾ stick unsalted butter, cut into small pieces
1 pound angel hair pasta
Juice of 1 lemon
Salt to taste

In a large bowl, combine the crab meat, jalapeno, garlic, mint and butter and set aside. Bring a large saucepan of salted water to a boil. Cook the pasta according to package directions. (Approx. 3 to 4 minutes)

When pasta is al dente, do not strain, use tongs, slotted spoon or spaghetti fork and add it to the crab mixture. Toss, then add the lemon juice and season with salt.

Note: Perhaps you do not need a full pound of angel hair pasta. You can reduce it to 1/2 or 3/4 lb. - it depends on whether you would like more crabmeat ingredients with your pasta.

HELP PROTECT YOUR STREAMS!

Unfortunately not everyone respects the regulations and rules of our waterways. The Tully in particular has special harvest regulations along with bait restrictions that aim to protect and enhance this fishery, the effectiveness of which are directly correlated to how many fisherman abide these rules. If you witness poaching, pollution, or other problems on the stream, do not confront the violators. Please call the SE Region of PFBC non-emergency dispatch at (717)626-0228. Enter this number into your cell phone so you have it when you need it.

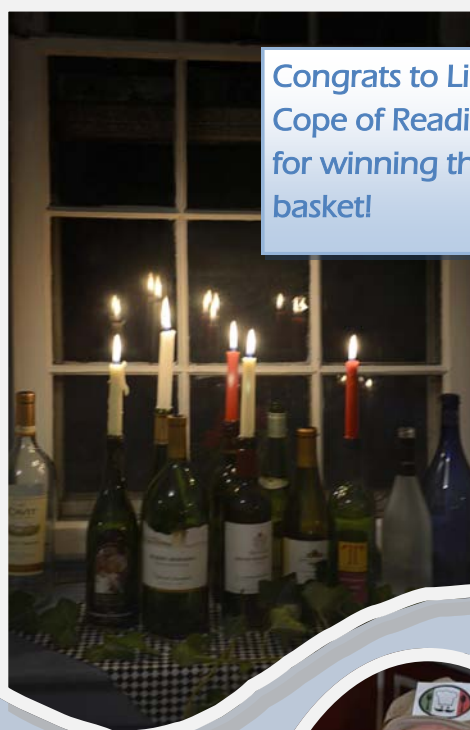

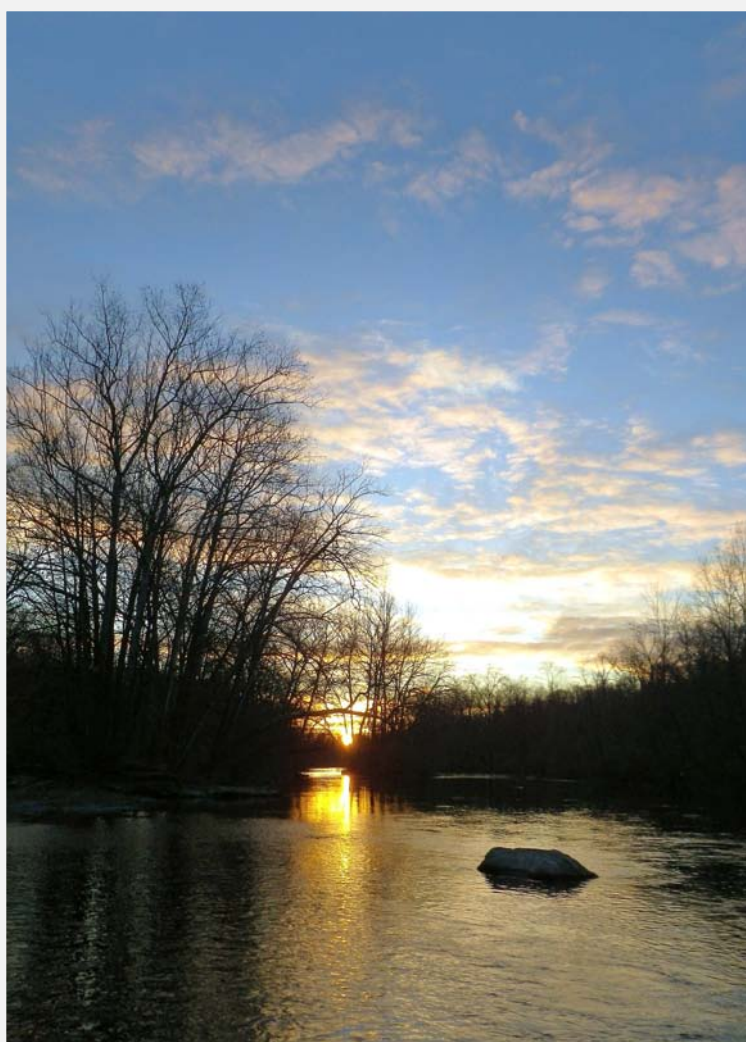

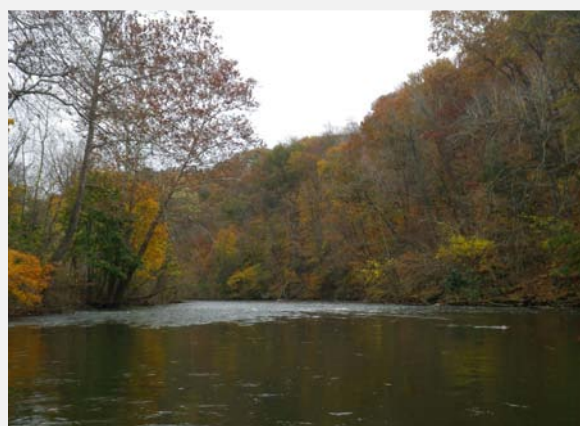

Tactics for Browns from the Big Lake

If you've never fished the tributary streams of Lake Ontario for monster brown trout, I'm sure you've heard stories or seen photos. It's true, you don't need to go to South America to catch 15+ pound brown trout.

A common misconception on many Great Lakes tributaries is that stealth is not important. But in fact, keeping a low profile combined with a soft stealthy presentation is the main key to catching a lot of fish. Go to any western New York tributary in the fall and you'll see anglers stomping all over the place "looking" for fish. Don't look, just fish! Fish the good looking "trouty" water. Tailouts of larger pools are a favorite resting or spawning area for these migratory fish. You will catch more fish if you can't see them, and in return, they can't see you!

Fish lighter tippet and less weight. Most commonly, a 3 or 4x 7.5 ft leader tapered to 4x tippet (7lb) will do the trick. Scale down those indicators to keep you in stealth mode. A small white stick-on indy, or a small white football indicator is all you need. I routinely find myself digging through my Tully pack looking for small split shot and tiny indicators before a trip to western New York.

Fish upstream. Fish that are fresh from the lake aren't particularly leader shy, so keep your silhouette out of their field of vision. Cast upstream or quarter it up and across, take those fish by surprise! Also, stay low while fighting a fish. You may break up the pool for a few moments while your giant brown does his

dance, but those fish will come back. Especially if there are a few females hanging close. Staying low and close to the bank will preserve the pool for another potential fish.

Let the water level and color determine your fly choice. If it's low and clear, go with smaller egg patterns and more natural looking nymphs. If the water is up a bit and maybe off color, go big. Bigger egg patterns or wooly buggers in black, white, and olive. Always have your boxes loaded for any and all water conditions.

Keep these simple tips in the back of your mind next time you head northwest, I promise they will catch you a couple more fish, and maybe the fish of a lifetime....
